

## Blue Ribbons for Child Abuse Prevention










## Make Your Own Pinwheel Activity Sheet





### What you'll need:

- ► A pencil with eraser
- ▶ 8 ½ x 11 sheet of construction paper
- ► Scissors
- Colored pencils or markers
- ▶ Paper fastener
- Plastic drinking straw

### How to make a pinwheel:

- Print the pinwheel pattern. You can reproduce this pattern on white construction paper with a copy machine. Be sure to cut the construction paper to 8½ in. by 11 in.
- 2. Cut-out the pinwheel on the solid lines only.
- 3. Decorate both sides of the construction paper pinwheel.
- 4. Cut the dotted lines from the four corners to the center circle. Try not to cut into the center circle.


- 5. Use the sharpened pencil to poke a hole through the four tiny dark circles. The pencil point also works well to poke a hole into the straw. Carefully push the pencil point through the straw about ½ inch from the top.
- 6. Make the tiny holes on the four points meet at the center circle.
- Push the ends of the paper fastener through the holes on the pir wheel, then push the fastener through the center circle.
- 8. Place the straw on the back side of your pinwheel and push the ends of the fastener through the hole in the straw. Open-up the fastener by flattening the ends in opposite directions.




## Pinwheel Template

You need: , a and a

- 1. Cut out the pinwheel. Then cut along the diagonal, dashed lines.
- 2. Use the pushpin to poke holes in the center of the pinwheel and in the four corners. Twist the pin to make the holes smooth. This will help your pinwheel spin.
- 3. Stick the pushpin through each of the corner holes, through the center hole, then into the top of the pencil eraser. (See drawing.)
- 4. Let your child blow the pinwheel. Watch it spin! Ask: What do you notice? What is making pinwheel spin? Can you make it spin faster? Slower? Can you make it spin in the opposite direction? How?

BODY SAFETY is a set of lessons and rules to help make sure all children are treated with RESPECT.

Your **PRIVATE PARTS** are the parts of your body covered by a bathing suit. All people should have **PRIVACY** when getting dressed or using the bathroom. We exercise **EMPATHY** when we respect other people's rights and care about them by thinking and valuing how they feel.


**CONSENT** is a word that means you have the right to give permission when it comes to how you are being touched. You are the Boss of you Body which means you have **AUTONOMY** - or control over your own body. You have a right to say "NO" to unwanted touches, like hugs and tickles.

Sometimes our body may feel nervous, scared, or uneasy about a person or situation - this is called our **INSTINCTS** and it's our body's way of telling us to pay attention, that we may not be safe. It's always a good idea to listen to our instincts.

Having a NO SECRETS rule at home is a good idea because no one should ask a child to keep a secret, even if it's small or happy. Surprises are okay because they are only kept quiet for a short time and then are shared with others.

Children are **INNOCENT** which means you are <u>never</u> to blame if someone breaks a body safety rule. Your **SAFETY CIRCLE** is a group of adults who know about body safety and are prepared to **PROTECT** you. It's important and <u>never too late</u> to **TELL** if a rule is broken, adults are **RESPONSIBLE** for helping keep children safe.
